# Plants to grow under oaks



Our native oaks are gorgeous trees but cast a good bit of shade and dislike wet roots, so planting under them presents some challenges. Check out "Compatible Plants Under and Around Oaks" for info about many aspects of growing oaks. #### **Ornamental of the Month**

Eriogonum fasciculatum



Buckwheat is a tough, evergreen, needle-leaved native shrub about 2ft tall by 3ft. Full sun, low water. In April, plants send up many 12" stems with short stalks radiating from the top. The clusters of small flowers can be pink or white. The petals age to a russet towards the end of summer. Pollinators love the flowers and the seeds are a food source for our native Harvester ants. #### **Edible of the Month**

Rubus fruticosa



Blackberries prefer at least 6 hr of sun a day, rich soil, moderate water, and good drainage. Plant 3-4 ft apart in rows 8ft apart. Self-fertile. Fruit is produced on 2 yr old canes. Both erect and trailing varieties do best if trellised. Good heat-tolerant trailing types are Boysen and Ollalie; good erect ones are Cherokee, Shawnee, and Cheyenne. Some have thornless forms. # A summary of the current Claremont watering restrictions www.ci.claremont.ca.us

(Look for "Water" under the "Living" tab)

- Houses with addresses ending in 0,2,4,6,or 8 can water Monday and Thursday; those addresses ending in 1,3,5,7,or 9 can water on Tuesday and Friday.
- No watering should take place between 9am and 5pm.
- Sprinkler stations should be turned on no longer than 15 min. each on watering days.
- The 15 minute limit does not apply to drip irrigation or to watering by hand (if carried out with a nozzle that turns off when released). Watering days do still apply.

## Remember to water trees deeply once or twice a month

Be sure your trees don't suffer if you remove a lawn or change to more drought-tolerant plantings. Trees provide so many benefits and take so long to mature that it is in our best interest to make sure they survive the current drought. They can and should remain an integral part of our gardens as we move toward more climate-appropriate landscaping. Did you know?

**Botanical Latin**: "Fasiculatum" is derived from a Latin word meaning "bundles", and refers to the leaves being attached to the stem in small groups (see the buckwheat leaves in photo at left). "Fruticosa" means "shrubby" or "bushy".

**Plant miscellanea:** The scientific study of blackberries is called 'batology'!

## Things to do in June

#### General

- ✓ Irrigate in early morning to reduce evaporation
- ✓ Mulch but keep it away from trunks
- ✓ Postpone major planting until the fall
- ✓ Check plants often for water stress

#### Pest/disease management

- ✓ Keep weeds down as they use water
- ✓ For whiteflies, hang sticky yellow traps in infested bushes
- ✓ Pick beans when they are dry to avoid spreading disease
- ✓ Wash aphids off with soapy water
- ✓ Treat yellow leaves with green veins with chelated iron

#### **Edibles**

- ✓ Pull garlic and bulb onions; cure indoors on newspaper til dry, store
- ✓ Rotate crops
- ✓ Avoid monocultures; include flowers and herbs to confuse insects

### Ornamentals

- ✓ Remove canes that flowered from climbers like 'Lady Banks", tie up new canes, remove suckers
- / Prune Rhaphiolepis and rosemary
- ✓ Pick and deadhead roses and perennials to prolong bloom
- ✓ Prune epiphyllums
